Finding Aunt Florice by Adrienne Pueschel

Over the years, I have become the official guardian of my family photos, my husband's family photos, my Aunt Dot's family photos, as well as a few from unknown relatives, friends, and possibly strangers. They are not yet properly organized by person and date, much less digitized, but at least, I told myself, they are safely stored away.

We received the sad news in mid-October that my husband's Aunt Florice had passed away at age 95 in Sheffield, Iowa. Aunt Florice was the eldest surviving sibling in the Pueschel family. We flew for 4-day trip for her funeral the weekend of November 1-4. We all stayed in nearby big-town Mason City (home of "Music Man" Meredith Willson). We first visited the nursing home where Florice had been staying. The wonderful staff there cried with us as we shared memories of her.

Next we visited the "famous" Rudd, Iowa, where members of the Pueschel family had lived and grown up since before the turn of the 20th century. Rudd's motto is: Not Bigger, Just Better. Indeed, Rudd's highest population was about 450 people in the 1920s, it is now in the low 300s! Incredibly, we found in town the newly established Rudd Historical Society Museum. Our group descended upon it like hungry family history lions.

Thankfully, my camera was charged and ready for all the memorabilia, from vintage clothing to postcards. They had a complete poster-sized collection graduating class photos of Rudd High School since WWI, with all Pueschel siblings handsomely represented. They had Aunt Arduth's cheerleading squad. They had Uncle Wayne's Boy Scout troupe. There was the original wooden chicken-hatching box used in the town's main chicken hatchery, with a plaque detailing that my husband's grandparents were the 2nd and 3rd employees there. They even had a rare 1915 farm photo with three rows of people, at least six of


them Pueschel. The Museum director, Joyce, actually gave Aunt Arduth an extra copy of this very photo. Where else would you get that kind of attention?

Meanwhile, Aunt Florice's son-in-law Doug was the hero of the weekend. He had arranged for us to view her collection of family photos, right there in the hotel dining room. They were in typical scattered condition; some duplicates we had all seen but many more were never-before-seen treasures. He said, "Oh just take what you want now because we'll just throw them out otherwise." Oh, no! I frantically managed to convince them to give us the photos, as I was willing to scan them for posterity. So Brad and I carefully arranged them in two USPS boxes the night before leaving town. I now have Aunt Florice's entire photo collection to organize and scan for Christmas, and newfound zeal for finally getting *all* of our photos done.


Thank you, Aunt Florice, for leading us to our family stories!
