# Excerpts from the Heritage Newsletter published by the Linn Genealogical Society – January 2017

**Google** - Google.com is a search engine with far reaching contents, such as Google Maps and Google Earth where amazing detailed satellite views and street maps can help zoom in on even the tiniest towns or villages. Run a search on surnames, ancestral locations and other topics of interest.

**Google Books** content is just staggering. It is the "world's most comprehensive index of full-text books." Create, save and share for free with Google Drive (drive.google.com).

**Google Translator** translate.google.com for a quick translation?

eBay - ebay.com is an online auction site to find family trees,

books, photo albums, old postcards, family Bibles and much more. Some genealogists scour eBay to rescue heirlooms they try to return to family members. Typically, items are listed in the **Everything Else Genealogy category....** check other categories such as books, collectives, antiques and jewelry. In your eBay profile, you can follow Favorite Searches and get email alerts and updates in your eBay feed.

**Maps** - David Rumsey Map Collection - davidrumsey.com website has 64,000 plus maps and other cartographic images on this site with a focus on rare 18th and 19th century North and South American material.

**Fire Insurance Maps** -The Library of Congress has an extensive collection of digitized Sanborn maps at loc.gov/ collections/sanborn-maps.

These maps, created by the Sanborn Map Company to evaluate potential fire hazards in communities, provided insurance agents the size, placement, square footage and building materials of our ancestors' property. First drawn in 1867, Sanborn maps are notable for their detail and use of symbols, often with color-coding to indicate building material (stone, adobe, brick, etc.).

**HeritageQuest Online** - Heritage Quest is a comprehensive treasury of American genealogical resources - rich in unique primary sources, local and family histories, convenient research guides, interactive census maps, and more. It delivers an essential collection of genealogical and historical sources - with coverage dating back to the 1700s - that can help people find their ancestors and discover a place's past. Now powered by Ancestry, this amazing collection consists of the following core data sets:

- · U. S. Federal Censuses
- · Genealogy and local history books and directories
- · Revolutionary War

· Freedman's Bank records

· Periodical Source Index (PERSI) Archive(1800 - 2009)

**Library of Congress** - This site helps you access many of the riches of the nation's library. The American Memory collection (memory.loc.gov) digitizes everything from maps to old advertising circulars, even audio and video recordings.

**World Cat** - worldcat.org connects you with the collections of 10,000 libraries around the world. You can search catalog information about more than 2 billion books, newspapers, images, sound files, microfilmed and downloadable materials and more. After you have found promising titles, WorldCat helps locate data in libraries you can visit or borrow via interlibrary loan.

**Podcasts** - Listen anywhere on any device once you sign up for a podcast. A favorite is Genealogy Gems with Lisa Louise Cooke, but there are many good speakers with interesting and useful subjects. Additional websites will be suggested in the coming newsletters.

She is recovering at home. Celeste has reserved a space at the bank near the Grower's Market for the society to hold its annual fundraising rummage sale on the second Saturday of July 2017.

#### Minutes:

Motion made by Polli Kucharik to approve the minutes of the October 11<sup>th</sup> meeting, seconded by Garnet Rigby-Wharton, and approved by all board members.

#### **Treasurer's Report:**

Polli Kucharik reported that the balance in our checkbook is \$1,025.10. All receipts submitted to date have been reimbursed. Garnet stated she still needs to submit a receipt for approximately \$6.00 for cardboard used to cover the windows during visual presentations at meetings.
