In the short time since April 2, 2012 when it was released, hundreds of volunteers have been indexing this census to make it easier to navigate. This is probably one of the best-organized projects since the WPA indexed records during the Great Depression.

The 1940 Federal Census has been posted at [www.nara.gov](http://www.nara.gov) free of charge to anyone interested in accessing this amazing database. I always say the National Archives deserves every taxpayer's dollar they receive and I think having free access to the census proves my point.

### **How to Access the 1940 Census**

I've found it confusing to know just where to go on the internet to view the 1940 Census images, so I thought I'd share what I have learned with our readers.--

First and foremost, is the official NARA website, [www.1940census.archives.gov](http://www.1940census.archives.gov).

Bear in mind that the closest you can zero in on your family will be their enumeration district (ED). Once you have done that, you will have to search each page of the ED to locate them. Hopefully, you will have a small ED to search through.

If you are able to locate the family in the 1930 Census, copy down the 1930 ED and the street address if noted. Luckily, Steve Morse and Joel Weintraub have devised an ED conversion tool which is posted on the NARA website.

Once you arrive at the NARA home page listed above, click on Census Search. This will take you to a search page where you choose Search by Enumeration Districts and click on 1930 ED. There you fill in the name of the state and the 1930 ED, then click on "View It." The results may include only one possibility, or there may be several. If there is more than one possibility, you will be given a list of possible cross streets to nail down the correct one. You can click on "Map" to view the streets. Once you determine which 1940 ED to search, click on the "View ED #" to begin viewing the pages.

My ancestors mostly lived in large cities, so I found it helpful to locate their address on current city maps. (I used AAA to get the maps.) This is where I got the cross streets in most cases. If your ancestors lived in a rural setting or in a small town, there might not be a street address, but on the other hand, you won't have as many ED's to sort through.

You may find, as I did, that your ancestors' street was not enumerated in the ED that supposedly includes that street, even though it clearly fell within the boundaries shown on the ED map. If so, you are out of luck, unless you want to search all the ED's for that city, which in my case was somewhat large. I will need to wait for the Ohio index to be complete to find that one.

Where can you find out where your family lived in 1940? Here are a few suggestions:

City directories, birth/death/marriage certificates, 1930 census (if they hadn't moved), WW II draft records, letters, just anything that gives an address close in time to 1940.

### **Three Census Indexing Projects**

There are three locations where the census is being indexed. Having three separate indexes prepared will greatly increase the chances of locating those elusive ancestors. (If you can't find them in one of the indexes, you probably can find them in one of the two others.)

#### FamilySearch

One organization is FamilySearch working in conjunction with brightsolid (a British genealogy company which is the owner of findmypast.co.uk). Their website is [www.the1940census.com](http://www.the1940census.com).

You can go to the [www.familysearch.org](http://www.familysearch.org) website and search for individuals by name and date (1940) if their home states (Delaware, District of Columbia or

Nevada) have already been indexed. I found it interesting to note that there are several states that have been completely indexed by familysearch.org indexers but are not available yet to researchers. This probably has to do with some behind-the-scenes steps needed to format the search query process.

### Ancestry.com

Ancestry.com is operating its own indexing project. This project will be completed in two steps—the first step will provide a basic name index, and the second step will generate an advanced search option. Ancestry.com anticipates the basic name index will be available in early fall 2012, and that the advance search index will be completed in 2013. The home for Ancestry.com’s census project is [www.ancestry.com/1940-census](http://www.ancestry.com/1940-census). You can currently search for ancestors in the 1940 census if they happened to live in one of the states that is already indexed.

### MyHeritage.com

A third company, MyHeritage.com is offering the 1940 census at the following sites:
