Write Your Family History – And Send it to the Library of Congress!

(The following article was a guest post on the Library of Congress Blog by James Sweany, head of Local History and Genealogy in the Humanities and Social Sciences Division at LOC. It appeared on January 13, 2014.)

The best way to preserve your family history is to write it down. By publishing your family history, you are able to capture and preserve the stories, pictures and genealogical data, making it available for other family members and future generations. A history of your family will make a wonderful gift for your relatives, and you may find that your family becomes inspired to help you seek out additional family branches.

As my colleague Anne Toohey wrote in her [blog post](#) on Christmas Day, by writing your family history, you are taking the known names, dates and places of your ancestors, and providing a historical context in a story-like form. This way, your ancestors become much more than names on a pedigree chart. They become people who lived during an earlier time, who had experiences through which you and others can get to know them through your narrative. If you include photographs and images of vital records or other significant events, the text will come alive and will be much more interesting for the reader.

The key to making your family history useful to others is the organization. A table of contents and an index of names and places used in your history will take additional time, but these added details will be very useful to future researchers consulting your history. Also, it is very important to document your research. By compiling and publishing a family history, you are inviting others to continue your research. Cite your records and document your sources. With documentation,

others can build upon on the work you have done, and your history is more credible. There are various style manuals that can assist you with citation styles for footnotes, endnotes and bibliographies. If you decide to distribute your family history outside of your immediate family, be sure not to include personal information about people who are still living in order to protect their privacy.

The Library of Congress can help you find books about writing and publishing your family history. For example, how-to guidebooks that will help you organize your family history and resources on how to find a publisher can be identified in the [Library of Congress Online Catalog](#). We invite you to seek guidance from our reference librarians through [Ask a Librarian](#). For assistance with resources that may be found in your local area, consult your public or nearby university library to search other library catalogs. Local genealogical societies and historical societies are also great resources for additional guidance.

When you write your family history, you may only be doing so for your relatives. However, we also invite you to consider [sending a copy](#) to the Library of Congress. Compiled genealogies and U.S. local histories are very important to the international research clientele who frequent the institution. The Library seeks to collect all published and self-published works available on these important topics. Through generations of such gifts, the Library has assembled the leading book collection of genealogy and local history information in the world.

And who knows, perhaps not yet discovered relatives will be led back to your family line through your sharing of your family story!

National Genealogical Society (NGS) Annual Conference 2015

It's not too early to start saving and planning to attend next year's NGS Conference scheduled to be held in St. Charles, Missouri (St. Louis area) May 13-16, 2015. Many genealogists will find that their ancestors have roots in St. Louis or passed through there on their way to other destinations. It is known as the Gateway City because it represented the border between the eastern (settled) half of the United States and the Western frontier. The St. Louis Genealogical Society (StLGS), which will host the NGS 2015 Conference, has more than 2,000 members and is the largest local genealogical society in the USA.

The conference begins on Wednesday, but the StLGS suggests additional activities such as a behind the scenes tour of the National Personnel Records Center, touring St. Louis with a local historian, researching at the St. Louis County Library or attending a workshop on German genealogy. St. Charles, where the conference is to be held, is a picturesque historic city on the Missouri River with plenty of hospitality and sightseeing.

If that is not enough, Melinda Henningfield, a Certified Genealogist who is a member of the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society, will be one of the conference speakers. Her planned topic is migration to Oregon. Several members of the RVGS will be attending the conference, as well.

Why not start saving up now for this wonderful opportunity if you think you might be interested? I attended a National Genealogical Society conference when one was offered near my home in California, and I thought it was an invaluable experience. There will be nationally recognized genealogy speakers with something for everybody. More than a hundred vendors will be showcasing their products and prize drawings will take place throughout the week, not to mention the chance to “talk genealogy” with others to your heart’s content.

Atlas of Historical County Boundaries <http://publications.newberry.org/ahcbp/>

If you have encountered county boundary changes, this site will allow you to see those changes year by year. To fully understand the options you have available for using this site, I suggest you click on the Help link on any map page. The Help page will explain the features—how to change the date of a map, working with map layers, descriptions of map layers, and how to use all of the tools you will see on the map page. From the opening page, you can choose to look at state maps or a map of the whole United States. To start, from the map of State Data, click on a state that you are interested in. After clicking on a state, you then have multiple options such as viewing an interactive map, viewing an index of counties, viewing individual county chronologies, and much more. The chronologies are impressive. You can even download a PDF file containing Atlas data for each county. I did a sample download for Missouri, and the resulting PDF was 40 Mb with a complete county line history for every county in the state. All of the history is then overlaid against a map of current county lines, but even more impressive is the National Data Map. Click on the map and then on View Interactive Map. On the next page, click on the drop down menu and select a Boundary Animation. You then have three options to view an interactive map. The number to the right of each option is the number of seconds that the interactive map will run. These are YouTube videos, so you can watch them full screen and pause them whenever you want. The videos open up in a new screen, and you may need to allow pop-ups to view them.

Washington State Archives Digital Archives <http://www.digitalarchives.wa.gov/>

This site recommends that, if you are doing a surname search, you start by using the search boxes on the home page. I did that with a search for a great uncle who moved to Washington State about 1907. The result was 18 databases with about 650 files. To open a database, click on the + sign, then select the county you are

interested in, or you can click on Show All Records. Unfortunately there is no place to put in a birth year for your search. Many of the records I searched did not show an age until the file was opened. Individual database searches allow you to put in From and To dates. There is much to find at this site. As I clicked through the databases, I found that many of the results had free, downloadable images including marriage licenses and city directory pages. I found the city directory pages in a Miscellaneous Family History database. The images are JPEG, and after opening they can be saved by right clicking and selecting Save Picture As. The cemetery files gave age, death and burial dates and cemetery information. Land Records had the largest number of files for my search. In my sampling, all of the records were fairly recent, being within the last 20 years. From the home page, point to the Collection tab and select Record Series. From here click on any database, and you will see a complete list of what is available.






