## "Gretna Green"

Some of you may not have encountered the term "Gretna Green" yet in the course of your research. The name comes from Gretna Green, Scotland. After the Hardwicke Act (clamping down on "irregular" marriages) passed in England in 1754, the town of Gretna Green beckoned to prospective young lovers because it had fewer restrictions on age and other requirements. There have been similar places in our own country at various times and places due to differences in marriage (or divorce) requirements between the different states. One way to find these places is to Google the state name and the words "Gretna Green." Sometimes this can be helpful to find out where your ancestors married if they cannot be found where you expect them.

# **Tips for Scanning Old Photos**

These photo scanning tips are from the Family Tree University course <u>Organize</u> <u>Your Photos: Preserve Your Family's Pictorial Legacy</u> with Nancy Hendrickson.

When you scan a photo to archive for future generations, scan it at a high resolution. Resolution determines image quality, and is measured in dpi (dots per inch). The more dots, the more storage space the image takes but the better its quality.

• Most scanners let you choose resolution settings. For archival purposes, scan photos at 300 dpi or higher. This results in a high-resolution master file, plus you'll have the flexibility of resizing a copy of the image at a later time to send via email. If you want scans only for web or email, 72 dpi is fine.

- Save your image in a TIF format rather than JPG. TIF files are larger than JPG files because they preserve more details. In addition, each time a JPG file is opened, edited and saved, it loses quality.
- If your scanning software lets you specify a target directory (the folder where you're saving the images), scan all the photos you want to go into that directory at once. This will save you having to select a target directory every time you do a scan.
- If your scanning software automatically saves to a default folder, such as Documents, group your scans by ultimate destination. Scan all of the files that will eventually go into the same folder, then move all those files together to that folder.

## **New York City Tax Photos**

From the Editor of the NEHGS Newsletter (The Weekly Genealogist) dated 10/5/2011, Vol. 14, No. 40

Last week, when I was fact-checking an *American Ancestors* column, I visited the website of the New York City Department of Records and Information Services to learn about ordering New York City vital records. My attention wandered to a subject heading toward the bottom of the left-hand navigation column: tax photos. Wondering what a tax photo was, I clicked on the link and discovered an amazing collection.

In the 1930s, New York City began to use photography as a tool for appraising real property for taxation purposes. Between 1939 and 1941, the city photographed every house and building in the five boroughs. The result was 720,000 35mm black-and-white pictures. From 1983 to 1988, after the city decided the earlier photos needed to be updated, every property in the city, including vacant lots and tax-exempt buildings, was photographed in color. Over 800,000 additional photographs were taken.

The Municipal Archives received grant funding to duplicate and microfilm the 1940s negatives. Researchers can view photographs from the 1940s collection on microfilm in the Municipal Archives reference room. And low-resolution copies of the 1980s tax photographs have been digitized for viewing on computer monitors at the Archives. However, it is not necessary to visit the Municipal Archives to order a copy of the tax photographs of a house or building. You can order a copy online or by mail using the forms provided on the website.

Other local governments used photography for tax purposes during this time frame. If anyone is aware of another collection like this one that has been made available to the public, please let us know.

Another photo collection available through <a href="NYC.gov/records">NYC.gov/records</a> is the <a href="Municipal Archives Photo Gallery">Municipal Archives Photo Gallery</a>, which includes sixteen thematic groupings, including celebrities, crime and criminals, parades, street scenes, and WPA. These images can be purchased online. Text on the website notes that plans are underway to move tens of thousands of digital images currently available only at the Municipal Archives online in the near future.

# www.backupmytree.com

If you are worried about losing your important genealogy files if (when) your computer crashes, there is a FREE, safe, simple service to save them. Created by

two experienced genealogy technologists, *BackUpMyTree* provides a piece of software (which works on either Windows or Mac computers) that you download, and then follow instructions to send a copy of your file to the website. The material is stored in an encrypted file until you need it. Once you have uploaded your files to the website, they are automatically backed up whenever you make changes to them. Many popular genealogical software programs are supported: Family Tree Maker, Legacy, Reunion and RootsMagic are a few examples.
