Although Celeste continues to recuperate at home from a nasty fall she took a couple of months ago, she was able to prepare and submit the following article about her research on a local Grants Pass citizen, Lulu Benedict Voorhies.

Local Pioneer Attends DAR 80th Anniversary Meeting



The Josephine County Historical Society has a unique group of history players who portray many of the pioneers of this county at local various functions. Shortly after moving to Josephine County in 1997 my first contact with them was during a cemetery tour at the pioneer IOOF Cemetery in late Fall. Walking through a pioneer cemetery in the dark and listening to the "ghost" of these pioneers was a trick as well as

a treat and the ambiance was thrilling to say the least.

Over the years since then I've attended many of the cemetery tours as an adult chaperone of Rogue Valley Young Marines who volunteer their time to serve as escorts for the cemetery tours. The historical players recite a short story about their "pioneer" and I often wondered how their script came together. A few weeks ago I set out to prepare a presentation about LuLu Benedict Voorhies, wife of pioneer newspaper owner Amos Earle Voorhies.



Well, I started this project at the Historical Society Library on 4th street and was pleased to have dozens of newspaper clippings to read through. The Voorhies Family frequently made news within the community and the newspaper wasn't shy to print their adventures. Mr. Voorhies was one of the first editor/owners of a newspaper in Oregon to receive news from the Associated Press. Mr. Voorhies and his wife LuLu traveled and regularly sent stories back home telling about their travel adventures. Good news for me in preparing the script.

Of course I referenced ancestry.com and familysearch.org for other information to round out details about LuLu. I attach a photo of LuLu on one of her trips abroad, and you can see she and Amos had lots of stickers on their luggage showing where they had traveled. Impressive!

LuLu made her first appearance since passing away in 1964 to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the local DAR chapter on April 26th 2014. I hope people enjoyed hearing from Mrs. Voorhies, who was a charter member of the Applegate Trail DAR Chapter.

I look forward to doing more research for the Historical Players and hope to make history come alive through these stories.

Recommended Websites

In honor of Cinco de Mayo (May 5), here are a few websites to help those researching Mexican ancestry.

www.familysearch.org

Don't overlook FamilySearch. It should be your first stop for any research project. I recommend clicking on the "Search" button, then "Records," then scroll down to the bottom of the page and select "Mexico." This will yield a list of the records they hold for Mexico, broken down by State. Remember, if a camera icon is shown, the images are available for viewing. If it says, "Browse Images," the names have not been indexed yet—but if it tells you the number of images, there is a searchable index for the data. Just to whet your appetite, the following datasets are available with searchable images: Mexico Baptisms 1560-1950 (43 million

images), Mexico Civil Registration 1832-2005 (1.5 million images), Mexican National Census for 1930 (just posted in March 2014).

Mexico Genealogy Forum. This is a message board for inquiries (and answers) about Mexican genealogy. It has a search function so you can search to see if anyone else has posted information or questions about your ancestor.

About.com Genealogy. This website contains links to *Mexican Genealogy 101* (a basic research guide), *Spanish Surnames* (explains about origins of surnames and how Spanish-speaker surnames are constructed), *Researching Your Hispanic Heritage* and other topics.

F. Warren Bittner, CGSM, is a genealogical researcher and lecturer, with thirty years of research experience. He holds an M.S. in history from Utah State University, and a B.S. in Business from Brigham Young University. His master's thesis looked at the social factors affecting illegitimacy in nineteenth-century Bavaria.

He is the owner of Ancestors Lost and Found, a small genealogical research firm. For six years he was the German Collection Manager for the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, where he coordinated contracts to microfilm and index records at 102 archives in seven countries and where he planned the German book acquisitions and internet publications. Before that he worked for four years in the extraction unit of the Family History Library, where he was coordinator of third-party indexing projects and where he developed and trained volunteers in Spanish indexing projects. He has also worked as a Reference Consultant at the Family History Library on both the U.S. and International reference counters. He has done research in more than fifty German archives and in more than forty U.S. archives and record repositories.

1st Session: 9:00 - 10:30 am

What's Happening on Family Search? Presented by Barbara Basden

In 2013, the Family Search website was completely redesigned to feature Family Tree. This session teaches you to find the millions of records available on this website, and also shows you how adding your information to Family Tree may be beneficial to your research. Barbara Basden has many years of Family Search experience and is RVGS e-Publications Director.

2nd Session: 10:45 - 12:15 pm

Finding Great-Grandma and Grandpa, too, and, Are They Really Your Ancestors? Presented by Melinda Henningfield, CG

This session reveals where you might look to find information about your ancestors and covers ways to be sure the information you find is truly about your ancestor and not about someone else's! As a board-certified genealogist, Melinda Henningfield has extensive experience in effectively using genealogy databases and websites. She wrote the article "Determining Linnie Leigh Gray's Birthdate" which was featured in the NGS Quarterly in 2010.

3rd Session: 1:15 - 2:45 pm

How to Organize and Manage your Genealogical Photos and Documents. Presented by Bill Strickland

In this session, Bill shows you a computer-based system and methodology for storing documentation and photos with the use of any spreadsheet and a scanner. He will also include ways of creating a document binder with multiple indices. Bill has taught computer classes professionally and for the Grey Bears, and other adult education classes in California. He also was a member and taught genealogy classes at the Genealogy Society of Santa Cruz County (GSSCC) before moving to Oregon and joining RVGS.

4th Session: 3:00 - 4:30 pm

Using Paper Trail: A Guide to Overland Pioneer Names and Documents created by the Oregon-California Trails Association. Presented by Jim and Sallie Riehl

Jim and Sallie describe this website, and how it can be accessed in this session. The database includes data extracted from original journals and writings and provides the location of the original documents. Photos of the Emigrant Trail through the Black Rock Desert in Northern Nevada will highlight one of the routes traveled. Experiences along the trails will be discussed. Jim and Sallie developed this database over time. We are pleased that they will come to Medford to share their knowledge of this interesting resource with us.
