Presenters will be Fintan Mullan, Executive Director of the Ulster Historical Foundation (UHF) in Belfast, Ireland, and Gillian Hunt, Research Officer from the UHF.

History Research, Part 1 A broad overview of Scots-Irish and Irish research, benefiting beginners and seasoned genealogists alike, it is practical, wide- ranging and informative using visual aids and exploring the major collections, the destruction of records in 1922, and the importance of place and administrative divisions in Ireland, the importance of doing your homework of records and how to access them

History Research, Part 2 Records Related to the Different Churches in Ireland This session explains in some detail the church records available for the main Christian denominations in Ireland: Church of Ireland (Anglican), Presbyterian and Roman Catholic, as well providing an understanding of the differences between the different Protestant denominations. It makes the important point that there are other valuable records (usually of church administration) relating to churches which can document family history and which are not baptisms, marriages, burials or gravestone inscriptions. The presentation also looks at the value of annotations found in Catholic Church records, which can be of great benefit the family historian.

Using Land Records: Griffith's Valuation, Tithe and Estate records
This session covers the major land collections including, Griffith Valuation, tithe applotment

books and tithe defaulters lists, the published Ordnances Survey Memoirs and OS maps. It also explores some other census substitutes for the nineteenth and late eighteenth centuries.

Emigration from the North of Ireland to North America and the Sources for Its Study
The story of the Scots-Irish and their experiences in Ireland and the New World are discussed in
this presentation. Using a range of documentary evidence, this presentation will touch upon, the
causes for migration, push and pull factors, the patterns of migration, the estimated size of the
exodus implications and its for the development of American colonial societyThe Ulster This
talk will look at those sources which can throw light on Ulster families in the seventeenth
century. It identifies documents relating to the Ulster Plantation (1610-41) which can be used to
construct profiles of settler families. It also considers sources from the second half of the
seventeenth century, such as hearth money rolls, the Civil Survey and poll books, which are of
use to genealogists working in this period.

Solving Your Brick Walls/Q&A With the huge explosion of online records on the internet, we have found in recent years the 'solving your brick walls' to be an important part of the programme. This session can help the beginner and the seasoned genealogist alike. The speakers use a range of online resources (including the most important ppv sites like rootsireland.ie) and their local knowledge to offer participants practical tips about Irish and Scots-Irish research. The session combines straightforward Q&A interspersed with searches in real time online etc., for specific research queries submitted by the participants.

It's even possible that your surname derives from the occupation of a distant ancestor.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Now Kentucky is up to no good! The legislature is considering a bill which will restrict access to vital records. Death records will be available to the general public after 50 years, but more recent death certificates will be available ONLY to:

Widows or widowers; a child (of decease) 18 or older; parent; grandparent; personal representative of the estate; funeral

directors handling the funeral; beneficiary of an insurance policy of the decedent; and a person with a claim against the estate

This means that you can't get any certificates for uncles, aunts and the like.

Birth records will be available only to the living individual or after 100 years. Divorce and marriage records will be available after 70 years.
