# APRIL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Each month at our meetings I remind those present that our organization is geared towards education of our members and the public. We do this by presenting speakers and programs that update genealogy buffs on the latest tools, software, Internet info, research aids and opportunities available.

Last month Beverly Wellington was our guest speaker and she spoke about writing a life story that can be left for family as a "first person" record of a long and interesting life. I issued a challenge following her presentation to our members to start writing "your" life story and to share it at the April 2015 meeting. That challenge is the subject of our meeting this month.

Many people in our group can trace their family back quite a few generations and have some idea what their ancestors looked like, how many children they had, when they were born and when they died. What really makes the story interesting is when more details come to light that make these people really interesting and alive. For example, if a grandmother was an expert seamstress, one feels connected when they share that talent. If that fact wasn't passed down to granddaughters, then a piece of family history would surely be lost for all time.

My aunt Josephine said my grandparents came to California in the late 1890's from France. Their brothers who came to California in the 1880's sponsored grandma and Grandpa. Both older brothers had connections to French laundries and that's where my grandparents met. In the "old country" my grandmother could *never* marry into my grandfathers' family who were considered socially unacceptable by her merchant class parents. Jacques and Pauline grew up in southern France but never met until coming to California. My Aunt Josephine shared these facts with me when I helped Aunt Josephine write her life story. I firmly believe a life story should never be forgotten.

I encourage you to write *your life story* and share it with your kin in the years to come.



Be creative with ideas for searches.

#### Tips:

- · Like Google, use quotes for exact phrases, and (minus) for exclusions.
- Always check "Include Description" in your searches.
- Select "Worldwide" Item Location for international interests.
- Don't restrict the "Categories" unless you absolutely need to.
- Save Your Searches!

Often you can take screenshots, rather than buying pictures. However, sometimes sellers have added watermarks to their images and/or have posted very low resolution images to discourage this

Browser plug-ins such as the Firefox add-on "Save Images" can make it easier to save high-resolution versions of images when the vendor tries to prevent you from doing so. (https://addons.mozilla.org/en-US/firefox/addon/save-images/?src=api)

Part 2: To buy anything on eBay you need:

- \* An eBay account easy to sign up and no complications
- \* (Access to) a PayPal account a bit more of a hassle.
- PayPal links to your credit card. Must be linked to your bank account (soon see below)

Three ways things are sold on eBay:

- \* Buy It Now (BIN) You get a guaranteed purchase at a specified price NOW.
- \* Make an Offer (MAO) (Combined with BIN) You make an offer less than the BIN price (50% often works). Seller may make counter-offer(s). Success not guaranteed (unless you pay the BIN price). Transaction time variable. May be trumped by other user's MAO offer, or BIN.
- \* **Auction** (Often combined with BIN/MAO). Success not guaranteed. Best way to get a cheap sale price, but you could be trumped at any time by BIN/MAO).

TIP: In a highly competitive market, or for items that are *really* important to you, use BIN or MAO. For items you can walk away from, use auction.

TIP: Watch out for shipping costs. Some items have a zero starting bid, but \$100 shipping!


